Fund Objectives

Japan Smaller Capitalization Fund, Inc. ("JOF" or the "Fund") is a non-diversified, closed-end management investment company listed on the New York Stock Exchange. The Fund's investment objective is to provide shareholders with long-term capital appreciation and to invest, under normal circumstances, at least 80% of its total assets in smaller capitalization Japanese equity securities traded on the Tokyo, Nagoya, and JASDAQ Stock Exchanges, the Mothers, Centex Markets, and other indices

or markets determined by the investment adviser to be appropriate indices or markets for smaller capitalization companies in Japan. Nomura Asset Management U.S.A. Inc. has served as the Fund's Manager since the Fund's inception in 1990. Nomura Asset Management Co., Ltd. has served as the Fund's Investment Adviser since the Fund's inception. The Manager and Investment Adviser are subsidiaries of Nomura Holdings, Inc. and affiliates of Nomura Securities Co., Ltd., Tokyo, Japan.

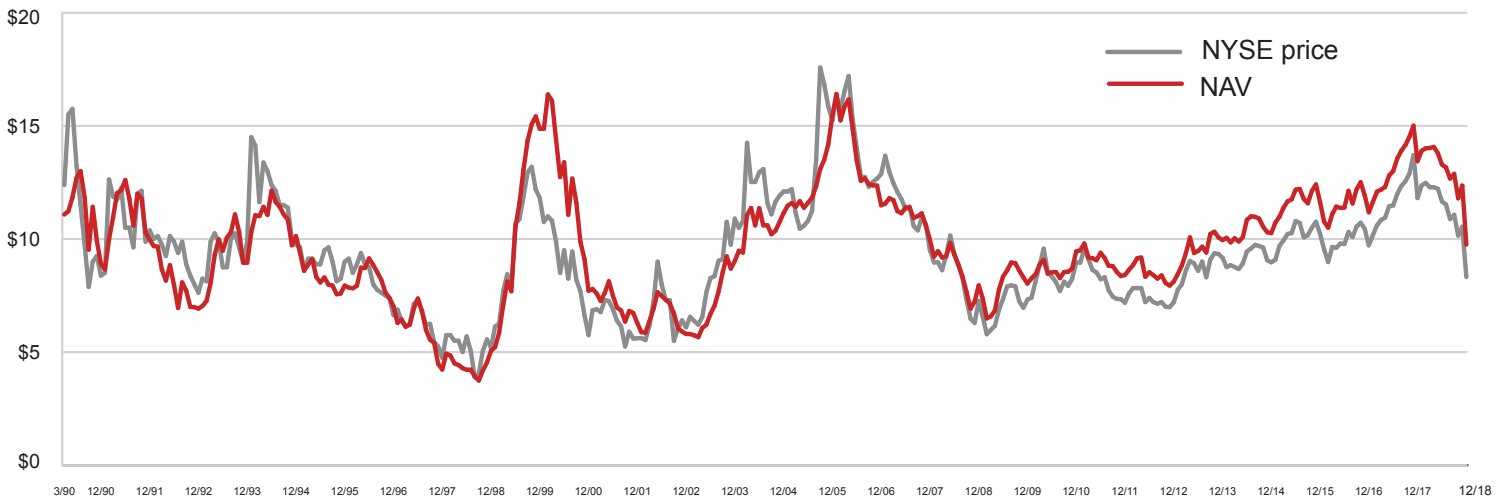

Net Asset Value Since Inception¹ vs. NYSE Closing Price (as of 12/31/2018)



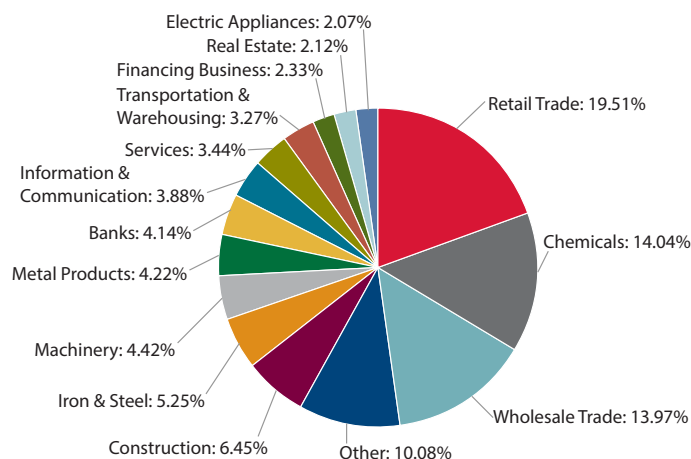

Manager's Commentary

Equity prices in Japan followed a steep correction in the global markets, and the TOPIX Index fell by 17.8% in the October-December quarter 2018, closing the year with a 10.4% slump in December 2018. Concerns about slowing global economic growth persisted. Trade issues and fears about economic conditions in China also weighed on market sentiment, while a summit meeting between president Trump and Chinese leader Xi Jinping at the beginning of December failed to provide any near-term clarity. Japan's latest earnings results failed to meet earlier estimates, while fewer Japanese companies than expected have revised their earnings guidance upwards in light of the recent deterioration in global economic prospects. This helped to fuel a continued sell-off of Japan stocks by international investors during the fourth quarter.

Economic data appears to have been levelling off recently. Industrial Production Index figures were -0.4% (MOM), +2.9%, and -1.1% for September, October, and November 2018 respectively. Natural disasters affecting Japan this year caused some weakness in August and September, but softening external demand seems to be preventing a clear recovery in production activity. Domestic demand has remained stable despite the global disruption, as Total Retail Sales increased by 1.4% (YOY) in November 2018. The Japanese government revealed plans to include various tax exemptions and subsidies to cashless transactions to mitigate the negative impact of a consumption tax hike scheduled for October 2019, but there was little market reaction to the announcement.

All sectors ended lower in the fourth quarter. Among economic sensitive cyclical sectors, Capital Goods was the worst performer given its assumed vulnerability to a slowdown in Chinese production activity resulting from the China-U.S trade tensions. Commodity stocks also plummeted along with the drop in crude oil prices. Even defensive sectors failed to elude the sell-off. The Communications sector deteriorated as the largest mobile phone operator, NTT Docomo, announced plans to slash charges to its customers, raising concerns about price competition and a substantial decline in industry profit margins. The Medical sector had been the strongest for the year to date, but encountered aggressive selling in December, possibly due to profit taking at the year-end.
