Fund Objectives

Japan Smaller Capitalization Fund, Inc. ("JOF" or the "Fund") is a non-diversified, closed-end management investment company listed on the New York Stock Exchange. The Fund's investment objective is to provide shareholders with long-term capital appreciation and to invest, under normal circumstances, at least 80% of its total assets in smaller capitalization Japanese equity securities traded on the Tokyo, Nagoya, and JASDAQ Stock Exchanges, the Mothers, Centex Markets, and other indices

or markets determined by the investment adviser to be appropriate indices or markets for smaller capitalization companies in Japan. Nomura Asset Management U.S.A. Inc. has served as the Fund's Manager since the Fund's inception in 1990. Nomura Asset Management Co., Ltd. has served as the Fund's Investment Adviser since the Fund's inception. The Manager and Investment Adviser are subsidiaries of Nomura Holdings, Inc. and affiliates of Nomura Securities Co., Ltd., Tokyo, Japan.



Net Asset Value Since Inception¹ vs. NYSE Closing Price (as of 3/31/2017)





Manager's Commentary

The Japan equity market was unable to maintain the upward momentum from the end of last year and the TOPIX Index eventually fell by -0.4% for the January-March quarter of 2017, mainly due to a -1.5% reversal in March 2017.

Recent macroeconomic indicators have been mixed. February Industrial Production gained +2.0% (MOM), (consensus +1.4%), led by robust automobile production. However, domestic indicators like real household consumption fell -3.8% (Feb, YOY), (consensus -1.7%).

Stocks that have rallied over the last six months experienced profit taking. These include Financials as the rise in long-term interest rates appeared to peak globally amid

waning prospects for a fiscal policy boost in the U.S. Optimism about the earnings outlook for Japan's financial industry also waned. The Commodities sector also declined on weaker demand for natural resources and materials. Electronics stocks continued to advance along with a solid mobile phone and memory chip demand helped by business restructuring efforts.

Global concerns about protectionist policies in the U.S., including a border tax adjustment, and the ability of the Trump administration to pass key fiscal policies in the face of internal Republican Party opposition, seemed to weigh on the market. Domestically, a political scandal indirectly involving Prime Minister Abe damaged investor sentiment too, and international investors were again net sellers

in March. However, despite a recent decline in support ratings in some polls, the Abe administration's overall approval scores remain relatively high.

Positive cyclical influences over the next few months include price hikes in commercial goods and services, durable consumer goods replacement, implementation of the government's supplementary budget and construction demand for the 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games. Hence prospects for a recovery in domestic consumption are gradually attracting market attention.
